



## Access to children and young people's mental health services analyses - PPIE

ACHDS PPIE Group: 11 Online and hybrid structured discussions

Advocates for children and young people – parents, carers and people working with children and families in the community: Three online structured group discussions (with 9, 16 and 6 people) and one 1:1 meeting





- helped prioritise topics and research questions
- reassured the team these were important questions to ask with the data available
- sense-checked results and interpretations
- Suggested who the team should share the results with



## Improved communication with the public

- Suggested Who the team should speak to next and how
- Practical feedback on clear communication with the public:
  - use graphs rather than tables but chose the simplest graph better still use a mix of graphs and infographics
  - > one graph per slide
  - have the take-home message in words
  - use higher resolution and bigger fonts



## Key reminders from the PPIE Group

- Talk to the people the results impact most the research must be relevant
- We're OK with health data being linked in safe havens for valuable research to benefit society — tell us about the benefits
- Be open about the quality and limitations of the data don't overinterpret - don't over egg the pudding!


