Study updates

Co-producing a bereavement support in care homes toolkit. Dr Maria Drummond

Last autumn, Maria Drummond met with care home staff through focus groups to discuss bereavement care. These focus groups were to understand bereavement generally, to

Research Round Up

There are a few studies recruiting just now worth highlighting.

Care homes in **Aberdeen**, please have a look at the "**Transitioning into care**" study From **Lucy Halamova at Aberdeen University**. This is an important topic and I believe this is the last month of recruitment. By coincidence we have **Clare Halpenny** from **Edinburgh University** looking to explore similar experiences with **Edinburgh/Lothian care home residents**.

Dr Jenni Burton's, Scotland wide, survey is attempting to get some "real figures" around how many **residents with Advanced Dementia** are being cared for in social care. Often, the numbers attributed to the population of people living in care homes with dementia are estimated. The importance of having a more accurate understanding relates to social care provision and funding. All information and the link to the survey is below.



Estimating the prevalence of advanced dementia in Scotland's care homes: a national survey

Many homes across Scotland provide specialist care and support for people living with dementia however, we do not know how many people are currently living with advanced dementia in Scotland's care homes.

Researchers from the University of Glasgow have been asked by Alzheimer Scot to investigate this with the aim of shining a light on this population and their needs. We would greatly appreciate your help and support. We are doing a short online survey, looking for one response per care home, to build up a picture of the numbers of people living with advanced dementia and their funding and looking for your professional perspectives on the recognition of advanced illness.

The study documents (participant information, privacy notice and consent form) can be accessed from SURVEY⁵ link to participate.

In recognition of your time and our gratitude, we are offering the chance to win a pair of tickets with travel expenses and the cost of staff time (to enable backfill to be arranged within the care home) to attend either the Alzheimer Scotland Conference or the Scottish Dementia Research Consortium Conference in 2025.

CLASP-Reducing/stopping insulin dependency in older adults.

This is a currently a **Tayside** only study.

Many care home residents with **type 2 diabetes** are on insulin injections, an extra challenge for care home staff. This study is looking to find a safe approach to reducing or stopping these treatments, improving quality of life, reducing tasks for care home staff and possibly reduce district nurses time.

Requirements are 70 and above, have type II diabetes, on insulin and access to a smart phone.

Up and coming....

Using and Improving Scotland's care home data.

Dr Jenni Burton from the University of Glasgow is developing methods of understanding and collecting new and existing care home data for use in future research. Initially this will involve interviews with care home staff to discuss care home collection methods.

You will soon be invited to take part in this research around the use of care home data in Scotland to inform policy and practice.

LifeLegacy: A pilot study on an AI-driven LLM conversational avatar in a care home setting

This will be trialling an AI avatar designed to alleviate isolation and loneliness in elderly as well as basic health checks. If you want to be part of the future keep an eye open for this one.

Family Meetings:

Over the past couple of months, ENRICH Clinical Studies Officers (CSOs) have been visiting care homes across Scotland to talk about research and how ENRICH can support residents, family members and staff to be more confident in research.

CSOs Diane Munn, Maureen Brown, Dr Rosalie Ashworth and Denise Munro visited four care homes: Northgate House Care Home (Glasgow); Rashilee Care Home (Erskine); Burnlea Care Home (Largs); and Carnbroe Care Centre (Coatbridge). They were warmly received by staff and had the opportunity to meet with residents and family members who generously shared their time.



Expanding on ways to get involved, Dr Rosalie Ashworth and Denise Munro discussed the crucial role of Patient and Public Involvement (PPI) in research. This approach invites care home staff, relatives, and even the residents themselves to step into the role of coresearcher. PPI is all about harnessing the valuable perspectives and lived-experiences of stakeholders to guide and shape research from its inception to its conclusion. This is crucial to increasing the relevancy and impact of research. Contributions can vary widely, including steering study priorities and providing feedback on research proposals, contributing to study design and materials, interpreting results, and helping to share findings in an accessible and meaningful way. There is a role for everyone in PPI, with options to fit each individual's experiences, interests, and availability.

We are so grateful to all the care homes who welcomed us, and with more care home visits lined up in the coming weeks, we are excited to continue to connect with the care home

community. These visits are a cornerstone of our commitment to include more voices in the research process and to ensuring that the research ENRICH supports places your loved ones needs and experiences at the heart of scientific inquiry. We invite all interested parties—whether you're a care home staff member, a resident, or a relative—to consider how you might like to be involved in research. Every contribution, no matter the size, plays a pivotal role in enriching understanding and enhancing the quality of life within care home settings. Together, we aim to build a collaborative, informed, and caring research community.
